To prohibit civil liability actions from being brought or continued against manufacturers, distributors, dealers, or importers of firearms or ammunition for damages resulting from the misuse of their products by others.

- 3 Section 1. Short Title.

- This Act may be cited as the "Firearms Heritage Protection Act of 2002."
- 5 Section 2. Findings; Purposes.
- 6 (a) FINDINGS. The Congress finds the following:
- 7 (1) Citizens have a right, under the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution, to keep and bear arms.
 - (2) Lawsuits have been commenced against manufacturers,
 distributors, dealers, and importers of nondefective firearms, which
 seek money damages and other relief for the harm caused by the
 misuse of firearms by third parties, including criminals.
 - (3) Businesses in the United States that are engaged in lawful commerce involving the sale and distribution of firearms and ammunition are not, and should not be, liable for the harm caused

1		by those who criminally or unlawfully misuse firmarms or		
2		ammunition.		
3	(4)	The possibility of imposing liability on an entire industry for harm		
4		that is the sole responsibility of others is an abuse of the legal		
5		system, erodes public confidence in our nation's laws, and		
6		threatens to diminish a basic constitutional right.		
7	7 (b) PURPOSES – The purposes of this Act are as follows:			
8	(1)	To prohibit causes of action against manufacturers, distributors,

- 1 (b) DISMISSAL OF PENDING ACTIONS A qualified, civil liability action
- that is pending on the date of enactment of this Act shall be dismissed

- 4 SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.
- 5 (a) This law shall take effect immediately upon enactment of this Act.
